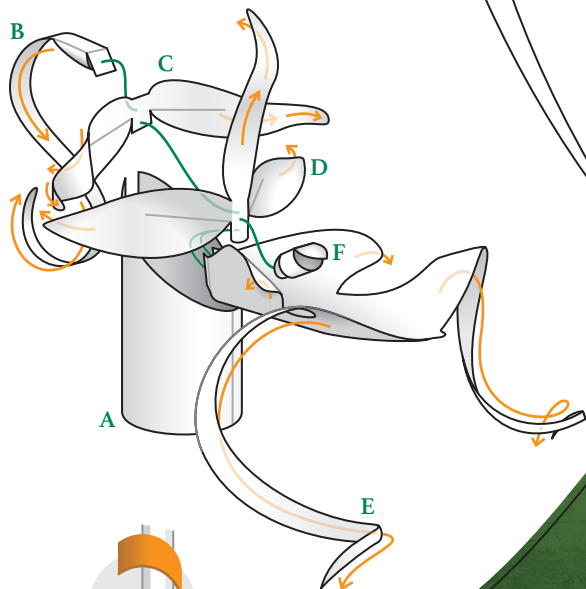

Ghost Orchid



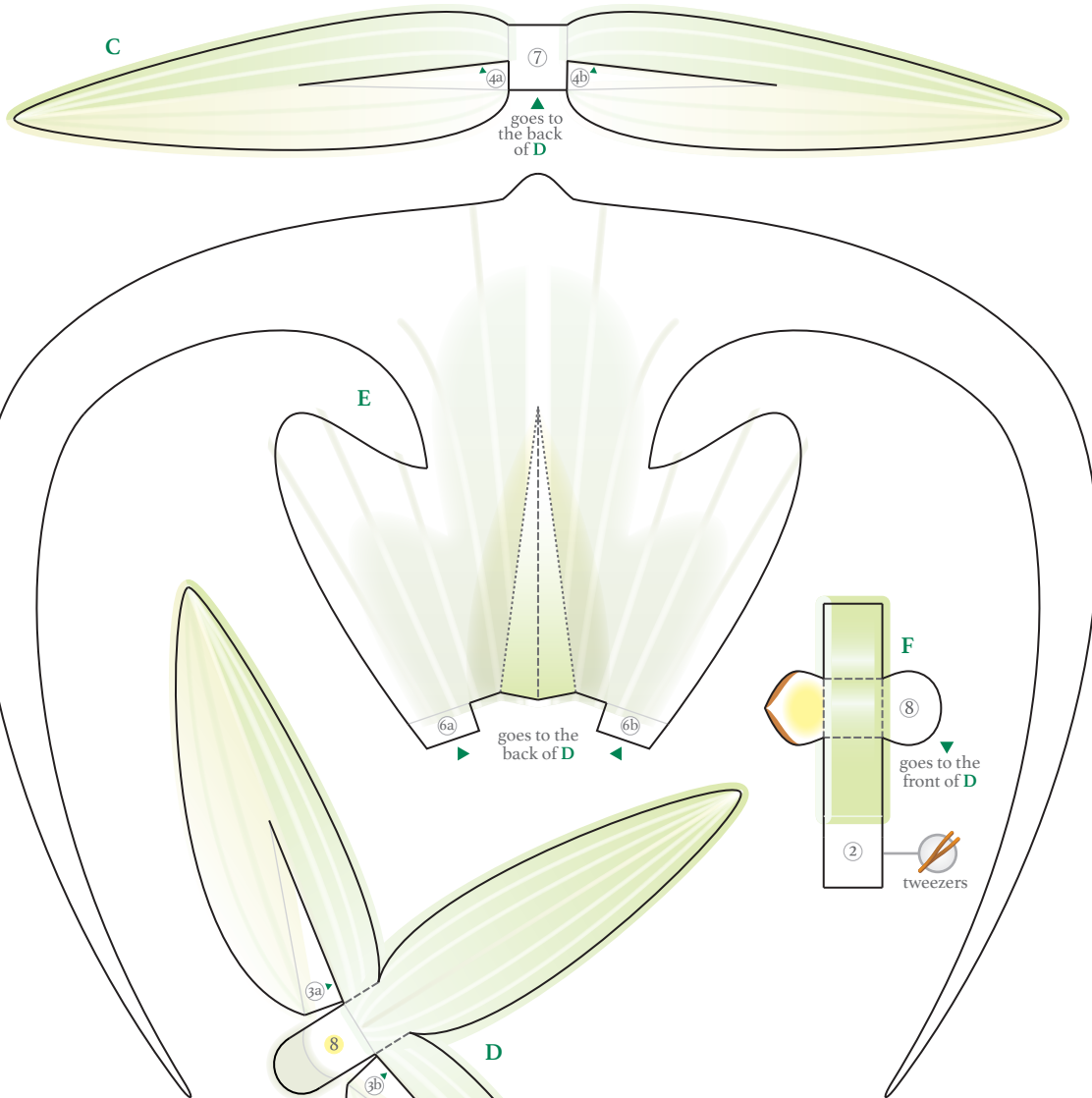
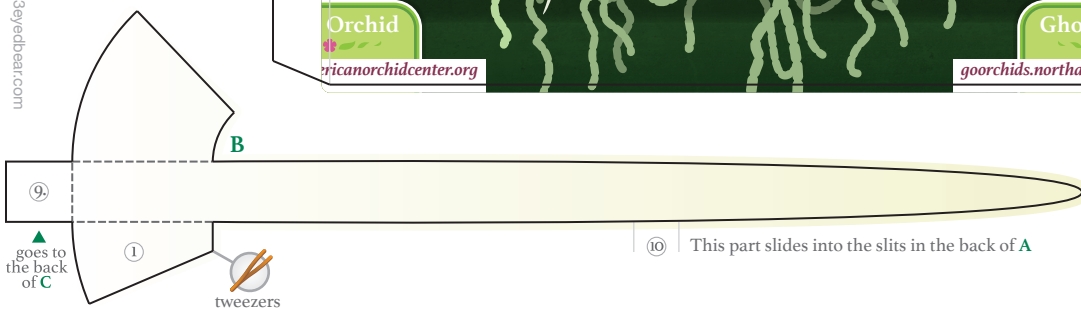
This elusive orchid haunts the swamps of Florida and has been the topic of a book (*The Orchid Thief*) and a movie (*Adaptation*).

An epiphyte, the Ghost Orchid uses its roots not just to cling to its host tree, but to photosynthesize in the same way other plants use leaves. Conservation efforts to restore this endangered orchid are underway. 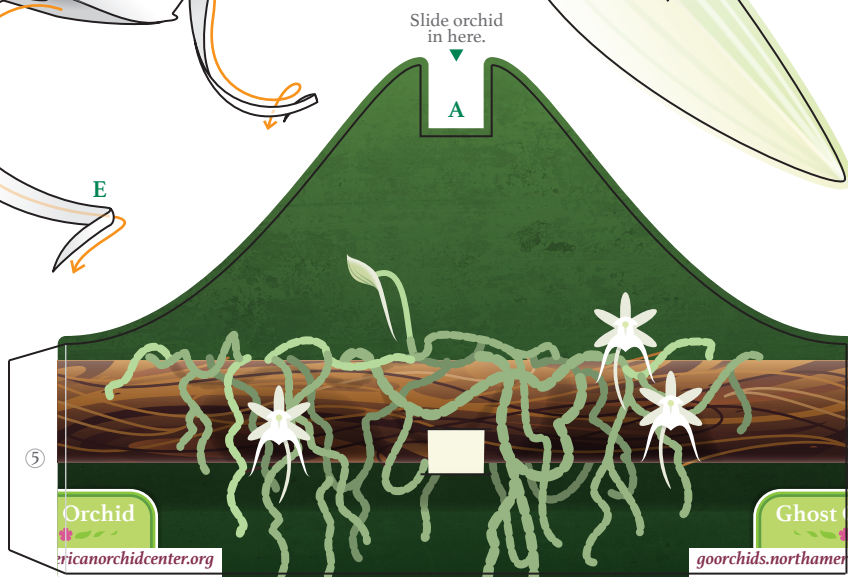
Orange arrows indicate where you can gently curl the paper around a pencil or similar object.

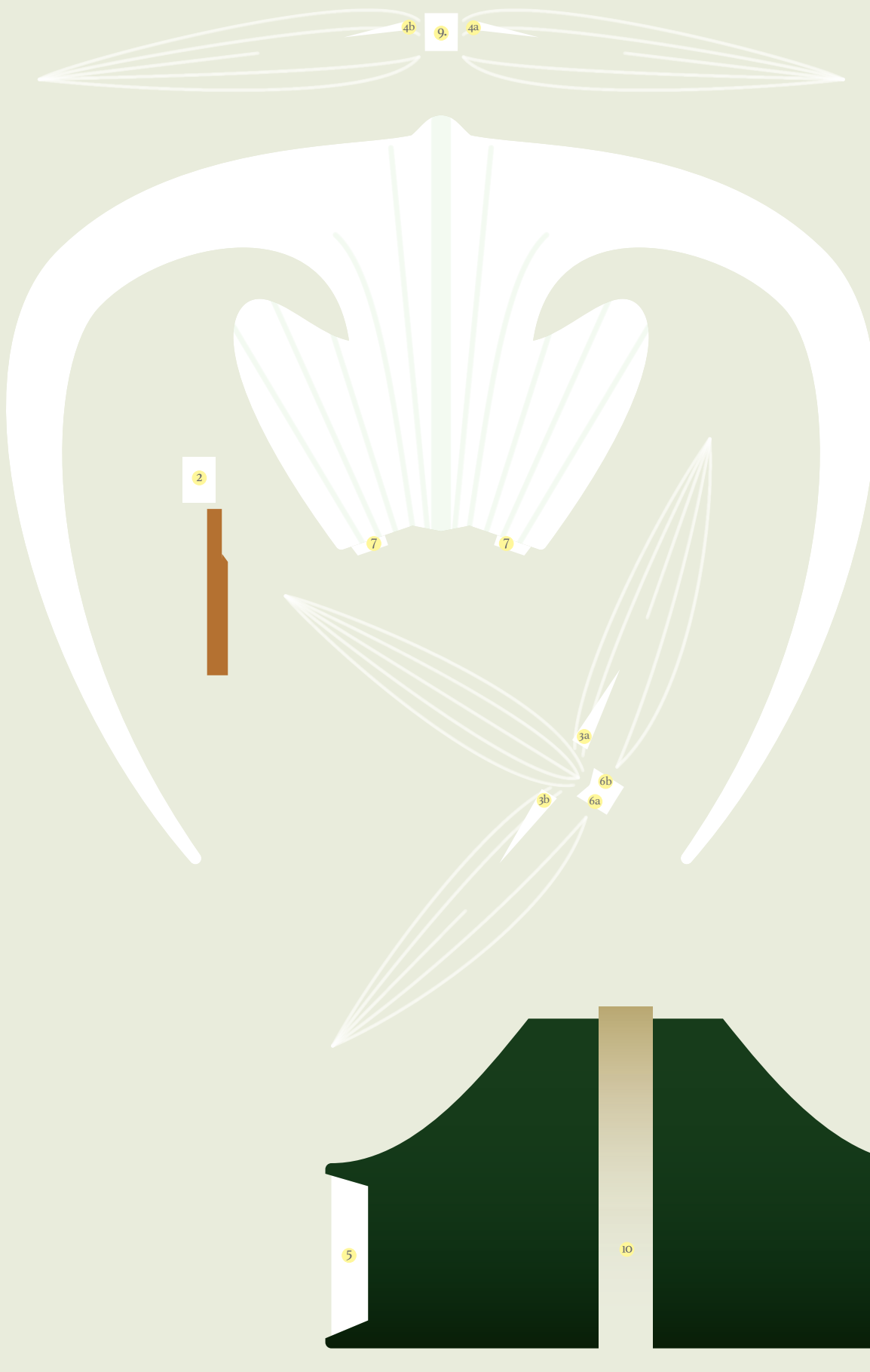
